

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#### Solve a Mystery!

Like most detectives, the Boxcar Children sometimes send each other secret messages. Here's how they make disappearing ink.

#### You will need:

lemon juice a lollipop stick notebook paper

#### Here's what you do:

Dip the stick in lemon juice. The stick is your pen; the juice is your ink. Write your message on the paper. When the lemon juice is completely dry, it will become invisible. Now fold up the paper and pass it along. When you send your message to a friend, be sure to whisper to him or her to hold the message near a warm light bulb. (Tell your pal to be sure not to put the paper directly on the light bulb, however.) The heat from the light bulb will turn the lemon juice ink brown, and your message will appear.

But be warned — once a disappearing ink message appears, it can never disappear again.




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

#### What Did You Say?

When great detectives (like the Boxcar Children) are working on a case, they sometimes have to give each other secret information. What better way to keep a secret secret than by using this special language?

Here's what you do: Example
Divide any word into syllables.

Box · car

Say the first syllable without the first consonant. ox

Attach the consonant to the end of the first syllable, and add the sound *eeda*. ox · beeda

Now do the same thing with the second syllable. ar · ceeda

So the word "boxcar" would be oxbeeda-arceeda.

If the syllable begins with a vowel, just add *eeda* to the end of the syllable. If the word is a one-letter word, just add *eeda* to the end of the word.

Now, you try and figure out what this secret message says:




